

Example of how to attach a child seat in a motorhome

Pictures are from a C19 dinette seat – with backrest removed showing lap belts and tethers.

Depending on the size of the child it may be necessary to fix the dinette in the lower position, i.e. bed, while travelling. For example: Sometimes the child might be too big his legs to fit comfortably under the table therefore it can be an idea to lower the table.





The third belt is referred to as a 'Tether' which is permanently affixed to the top of all child seats as shown above. The tether on the child seat must be properly secured to the tether attachment located in the dinette seating area on all Cruise vehicles (see photos above and left).

The pictures below show Child Seat tethered without the seat cushion backrest. This is optional—it makes it easier to install/set-up, but leaving the backrest in place works too. There is not much difference in installing it either way.



1) Dinette seat and backrest removed




2) Child seat placed on Dinette – unattached



3) Child seat being installed. Tether and lap belt attached (but not cinched)



5) Child seat fully installed and cinched tightly



4) Top tether attached to lower anchor



6) Lap belt secured



7) View of child seat from opposite side of dinette
